Kagera Visit 2023

The Revds Sarah Gull, Sarah Geileskey and Susan Taylor have returned from Kagera they have each sent us their first impressions.

Sarah Gull, as a former doctor I was particularly interested in the healthcare in Kagera, and spent some time with the staff at Murgwanza Hospital. This included a teaching session on obstetric emergencies and a trip to an outlying health centre, where basic care for low-risk pregnancy and treatment of common infections, such as malaria, is provided. There is no substitute for actually going to a place to make connections and friendships and to aid mutual understanding. The challenges in the hospital seem insuperable, but less easy to ignore if you are actually there. Small-scale contributions, such as provision of spectacles, would make a difference. Working relationships will help important decisions around the future of the hospital.

Sarah Geileskey, it would be easy to focus on the differences between our diocese and Kagera diocese, so it was good to be with the community in Kagera, to go deeper in conversation and in communion: finding that which we share in common - the love of God from which nothing can separate us. I was on common ground working with a small group of children at Ngara Anglican Primary School to lead with them the same words prayed by pupils of St Margaret's CEVAP School in Ipswich. In familiar territory, distributing communion among those worshipping on a Sunday morning. Sharing burdens; reflecting with ministers on the challenges of finding sabbath rest and spiritual refreshment. Noticing the ways in which too many people are going hungry: reliant on basic food provision or top-up-shops.

Our differences are significant, of course. Yet by being with one another, spending time together and celebrating all that we share made room for questions. We were challenged by the environmental realities of increased consumption. Gender issues were often before us. Visible, abundant and generous hospitality and public offertory contrasted with private-personal-quiet patterns of faith-full living and giving.

This was incarnational ministry. For God is with us in Jesus, that we might see and learn and live differently. So we too, spend time with one another, recognising that each of us is made in the image of God and that we all have something to reveal of God's truth in the world. This is the value, the joy and the challenge of spending time with one another, supporting and encouraging one another and for this, I am grateful!

Susan Taylor, Kagera is a place of great warmth. The red earth glows with each glorious sunrise and sunset. It is warm in climate, situated at 6000 feet, the temperature is comfortable; the air dry. But it is the warmth of the friendships, made and renewed, that really makes my heart sing. Relationship is the heart of who we are as human beings; who we are made in the image of our creator. And our short time with our sisters and brothers in Christ in Kagera has been so important in growing together through our mutual love of Christ and through those mutual joys and challenges of being human. It was a deep joy to see and experience the warmth of faith lived out in practical community development and assistance; expressed in beautiful, rich song and joyful dance; in the care and generosity we received.

Bishop Martin and Adam Geileskey both remain in Kagera as they travel further field to Lake Victoria, visiting among others, a children's centre in Biharamulo, a primary school and survival unit (for vulnerable 6 - 12 month babies), attending a confirmation service for 26 people joined by nearly 600 people in the congregation, a community church at Kimbuja and a church under construction at Bunazi near the Uganda border.

We can look forward to hearing more about the trip to Kagera over the summer.
