News from the Diocese

Dear colleagues,

THANK YOU

I am writing this to offer our ongoing support and resources to church schools across the diocese. Above all, I wish to thank our Headteachers and school staff for all that they are doing and continue to do to deliver online learning to pupils at home and to care for vulnerable children and the children of critical workers.

It has been good to be in phone contact with Headteachers over recent weeks and I wish to pay tribute to Headteachers and all school staff for their creativity, resilience and positive approach. It has been so encouraging to hear of all that schools are doing. Schools are making huge efforts to deliver imaginative online learning, keep in touch with vulnerable families and ensure that free school meals are available to those who are eligible. The introduction of a national voucher scheme for parents has been challenging nationally and schools have been amazingly resourceful.

The DfE has tasked local authorities with co-ordinating the provision of childcare in schools across the maintained and academy sector. Karen Harman and I have shared joining first daily and now twice weekly Skype calls of the Schools Co-ordination Task Group. The group includes key senior SCC officers, DfE officers, other sector leads and the Executive Officer of the Suffolk Primary Headteacher' Association (SPHA). Various protocols have resulted from this close collaboration and issues have been escalated to the DfE. The group agrees key messages to go to all schools daily on <u>Suffolk Headlines</u>. Please do email or phone me with any queries which you would like raised with this group.

I hope you have found the <u>list of resources</u> we sent on collective worship useful. Nationally the <u>Oak National Academy</u> is now offering online resources, including assemblies. Re-Opening Forum for Heads

The aim of the forum is to allow heads to share both their concerns and ideas You may have seen the national launch of the Church of England's new **#faithathome** campaign on Thursday. It includes a thank you to <u>school leaders</u>, to <u>parents</u> and to <u>church leaders</u>.

There's a song that has been written for the campaign for schools to record called 'Looking for the Rainbow' – it's by Becky Drake from www.worshipforeveryone.com - she is Chaplain at a school in Birmingham, and they have made this multi-screen video of their students singing it – watch here. The Church of England is about to launch a campaign to get 1000 schools to record this song in time for 'Thank a Teacher Day' on 20 May, and we would love schools to get involved. There is a really helpful <u>set of resources</u> which gives all the backing tracks and tips on how to do it technically which looks straightforward enough, and we'd love to get schools from our Diocese doing it. Then we'll share it out on social media etc. using the #faithathome hashtag.

Locally, Karen Harman has updated our <u>bereavement</u> <u>guidelines</u>, published last year, with an <u>appendix</u> to deal with the current Covid-19 situation. You can find this along with all our other Corona Virus resources on our <u>website</u>.

You may also find this <u>paper on trauma</u> helpful. I heard the author, Professor Christopher Southgate talk recently about the three phases of dealing with a trauma as the heroic phase, which is followed by the disillusionment phase, from which we hope to emerge into the wiser living phase. Professor Southgate was involved in the aftermath of the Grenfell Tower tragedy.

The diocese has taken the decision to apply for the government's Job Retention Scheme, in common with many employers and dioceses. This means that the diocese is able to access government funding during a difficult period of financial uncertainty, when income from parishes is forecast to decline. 14 diocesan staff are currently on furlough, including two of the Education team: Phil Knowles and Gemma Kingston.

It is a feature of the government's scheme that staff on furlough are not required to undertake and must not undertake any work for the diocese. Schools are welcome to email me direct with any queries which they would have sent to Phil or Gemma. Karen, Jacqui, Daniel and I continue to work from home and we look forward to welcoming Phil and Gemma back to work soon.

We are anticipating a return to school and Karen has arranged to run Zoom meetings in May with heads to consider some of the practical issues about re-opening schools (see above). We await government guidance but will want to support schools as they wrestle with staff and parents' anxiety, social distancing and planning for a new Reception intake and how to end Year 6 well and prepare for transition to secondary school. We plan to deliver other planned training via Zoom, too, such as deep dives in RE and SIAMS (more opposite).

As a team, we are keen to support you in whatever way we can. Please feel free to contact us by email or mobile phone.

I wrote last time about trusting in the God who gives us hope for the future and hope is a feature of the Church of England's excellent resources. Whatever the next few weeks bring, we around the 'reopening' of schools to a wider range of pupils.

The two sessions planned for Monday 11 and Wednesday 13 at 2.30pm are now fully booked. However we will run more sessions if there is demand.

ADMISSIONS 2022-2023 - for VAs and academies

This is a reminder about your Admissions policy. Although I realise this is not a current priority, if your governors are planning to alter your Admissions policy for 2022/2023 entry, then this has to undergo consultation this autumn. Only such alterations as will impact a family's ability to successfully apply for a place, require consultation – dates etc do not. It is no longer a requirement that Voluntary Aided schools consult annually and none of our schools need to consult this year under the seven year rule.

The consultation window runs from 1 October 2020 to 31 January 2021 and if changes are planned then the policy must be up for consultation for a minimum of six weeks in that window. We are happy to support you with this process which is rigorous.

If changes are planned then it might be a good time for governors to discuss and decide this in preparation for the autumn as there will be much else to achieve as schools start to widen the intake of pupils.
