Following the announcement of new 'rule of six' restrictions to help limit the spread of coronavirus, the Bishop of London, The Rt Revd Sarah Mullally, who chairs the Church of England's recovery group, said:

"I welcome confirmation from the Prime Minister that places of worship can still hold more than six people in total, despite the new restrictions on gatherings, and the reassurance that public worship can continue. We will continue to work with the Government on specific areas relating to our churches and church-based activities."

Online experiences for Heritage Open Days

Friday 11 to Sunday 20 September 2020

St Edmundsbury Cathedral is offering online experiences to mark this year's Heritage Open Days.

The Ancient Library was founded in 1595 and has an extensive collection of books covering a range of subjects, including many of local interest. A new online document explores the fascinating stories behind who gave the books to the Library, many of them local people from Bury St Edmunds or the wider county of Suffolk. A second paper details the conversation work undertaken recently on two volumes.

The art of bell ringing is explained in a video made (pre-COVID-19) by James Sheen of the 'We Love Bury St Edmunds' group. It gives a great insight in to what happens in the Norman Tower, as we are not able to offer tours this year.

Established in 1994, Heritage Open Days is the country's largest community heritage festival and takes place annually They give people a chance to look behind the scenes and find out more about their local heritage.

The service is themed around creation, uses words and music from the Iona Community, with special arrangements created by Richard Hubbard for performance by Cantus Firmus singers and musicians, all filmed individually during lockdown. Richard has been working with Stephen and Gail Southgate, who lead the Pilgrims Together Lightwave group in Thorpeness, to devise the service, which includes footage filmed during the last few weeks around the Suffolk coast.

The special guest is the internationallyrenowned preacher, hymnwriter, composer, lecturer and broadcaster John Bell, who led a workshop and service at St Edmundsbury Cathedral last October. He has recorded a talk for this service from his home in Glasgow.

Join us online at this year's Diocesan World Mission Conference. Key speakers include Andrew Bradstock speaking on how Christians can engage in world issues at all levels. Andrew Bradstock has been researching, teaching and writing about the relationship between Christian faith, politics and social engagement for more than 30 years. An academic and practitioner, his experience includes establishing New Zealand's first Centre for Theology and Public Issues (at the University of Otago), codirecting the Centre for Faith and Society at the Von Hügel Institute, Cambridge, and Secretary for Church and Society with the United Reformed Church. He is author of Louder than Words: action for the 21st-century church (DLT, 2007) and the authorized biography of Bishop David Sheppard, Batting for the Poor (SPCK, 2019). He is an emeritus professor of the University of Winchester. He will be joined by Luke Harman from Christian Aid who will talk about a successful campaign using a range of activities to raise awareness of an issue in the public space. There will be opportunities for questions and discussion.
