Waveney and Blyth Deanery Environmental Action Group

Our first meeting was held on March 2nd at St Peter's Church, Holton. The aims of the group are for members:

- to share what is happening in their church / benefice;
- to find out what is happening in other churches in the deanery;
- to encourage each other in achieving Eco Church awards and working towards Net Zero Carbon;
- to create a network of expertise and experience in environmental campaigning and practical skills in the deanery;
- to promote projects and climate justice campaigns in the deanery.

At the meeting we heard about St Peter's Church, Spexhall's work to maintain its Ecochurch silver award status and discussed how to encourage other churches to join the scheme. It was seen as a good way for churches to strengthen their connections with their communities.

We are hoping to produce a map which shows which churches currently have an Ecochurch award so we can keep adding to it as more parishes get on board. So far I am aware that:

St Luke's and St Michael's in Beccles - bronze award, Spexhall – silver award Emmanuel Church in Bungay is rightly proud of its gold status. (See below for details of an Eco-church event there at the end of May).

Church of England's Net Zero Carbon Target 2030

General Synod voted in February 2020 for the whole of the Church of England to achieve net zero carbon by 2030. The vote recognised that the global climate emergency is a crisis for God's creation and a fundamental injustice.

The Synod asked for a plan to be made, setting out how to get to net zero carbon. That plan of action, called the Routemap, was approved by General Synod in July 2022 in a Motion that asked for the Routemap to be endorsed, requested every Diocesan Synod to debate the Routemap as it applies to them, requested high energy users within the Church to draw up a programme of action based on the Routemap, and called for progress reports to Synod every three years.

The Routemap was written by the Net Zero Carbon sub-committee of the national Environmental Working Group. It went to consultation from October 2021 to February 2022 and the responses received shaped this final version

Why not include Rev. Richard Stainer's "Green Tips" in your Parish / Benfice Newsletter or Pew Sheet?

For those of us who are gardeners this is the time for planting out and planting seeds. It can be a bit risky as there is still a chance of a late frost, but as long as you are prepared to cover anything that is very delicate if a frost is forecast then you can make a start. There is nothing as tasty and as convenient as growing your own produce and you don't need a big garden to grow quite a lot over the course of a year. You will save trips to the shops and cut down on air and road miles if your veg. and fruit come from outside your backdoor. If you only have a window box you can still grow your own tomatoes and lettuces. In some villages and towns allotments are available to rent – contact your local council. Growing your own is good for your pocket, good for your body and good for the planet.

Big Green Tips for May

Back in November we thought about the bathroom. Now let us turn to the kitchen and see what can be done to reduce, reuse and recycle in that area. Kitchens are big users of electricity, so here are some tips to reduce your electricity use in the kitchen:

- > Don't overfill your kettle just put in as much water as you need
- Use the kettle to boil water quickly and transfer to a pan on the hob for steaming and boiling vegetables or pasta.

- Make sure you use the right size hob for your pan. A bigger burner will waste energy and a pan that's too big will take longer to get to the right temperature.
- Make more use of the micro-wave. Too often we use it for defrosting (which if you plan ahead can be done naturally!) or reheating drinks. Micro-wave ovens use less electricity and cook well.
- Try to batch bake in other words have a baking day. Once the oven is hot it is more
- efficient to bake lots of things one after the other. Getting the oven up to temperature use a lot of electricity.

Green tip – 7th May

Clingfilm, while very useful, means a lot of wasted plastic. There are plenty of alternatives -

yes, they are plastic, but you can use them over and over again. Moopops from

Green tip – 14th May

The start of Christian Aid Week when we think about those who struggle to grow enough to eat for their family. The climate crisis is making food shortages much worse in many countries. Christian Aid works with farmers in developing countries to mitigate the effects of the climate crisis. Why not follow the old Passover seder tradition of setting an extra place at your table for Elijah and donating the cost of a meal each day to Christian Aid?

🌮 Green tip – 21st May

Try to cut back on food waste by planning meals in advance and only buying fresh products as you need them. In the U.K. we throw away 7.1 million tons of food and drink a year from our homes and more than half of that could have been eaten or drunk. Keep an eye on use by dates, but more importantly use your eyes and sense of smell to decide if something is going off.

Green tip – 28th May

Clean your microwave the eco way! Heat a small, microwavable bowl of water in the microwave until the inside of the microwave looks steamy. Let the steam clear a little then wipe down the inside surfaces of the microwave with a clean cloth. Add a few slices of lemon to the water before heating it if your microwave needs freshening up.

Big Green Tip for June

Before the days of modern chemical cleaners we relied much more on natural cleaners that had little impact on the environment. Those cleaners (bi-carb and vinegar) work well, but sometimes take a little longer to. If you want to cut down on chemicals in your home and save some money try these tips this month:

- Blocked drains: While powerful liquid drain unblockers are handy in an emergency, many are harmful to aquatic life. With a little regular maintenance, however, you should be able avoid having to use them too often. Clear a stubborn drain by pouring 125g of bicarbonate of soda down it followed by 125ml vinegar. Cover with a wet cloth, wait 5 minutes, and then flush with hot water. To keep sinks and basins draining freely, pour a mug of soda crystals down the plughole regularly, then flush with boiling water.
- Descale the kettle the green way: You don't need to use a harsh chemical descaler to keep your kettle in good working order this is a job that distilled white vinegar is more than up to tackling. Fill the kettle with half white vinegar and half water and leave for a few hours. Empty and rinse thoroughly before making your next cuppa.

Keep your toilet smelling fresh. Instead of reaching for the bleach or a harsh chemical toilet cleaner when you want to freshen the toilet bowl, pour a cup of bicarbonate of soda down the loo once a week to naturally neutralise odours. Leave overnight then flush away.

Green Tip 4th June

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Recycle trainers that are past their best. You or your children may have an old pair of trainers that are falling apart. Drop them off at a <u>Reuse-a-Shoe</u> collection point in certain Nike stores (all brands are accepted) and they'll enjoy a second life. The materials will be separated and recycled into new clothes, shoes or even playground surfacing.

Green Tip 11th June

Remove sticky tape before you recycle. Many of the packages that come from companies you order from online are secured with parcel tape that isn't recyclable. It may be made of plastic or be reinforced with plastic thread. Pick it off before adding the cardboard packaging to your recycling bin. This way you can be assured that what you put in your recycling bin can actually be recycled!

🌮 Green Tip 18th June

Switch to eco-friendly washing up liquid. These days eco-friendly washing up liquid works just as well as conventional liquid. In fact, in a recent test by Good Housekeeping magazine of all types of washing-up liquid, an eco-liquid came out on top. Look for ones which are palm-oil free. If you can buy in bulk at a refill shop then again you will save money and the environment.

Green Tip 25th June

Make the most of what you've got! Each year in the UK we send 350,000 tonnes of clothing to landfill but by buying second hand, buying better and buying less and finding new ways to style the clothes you already own, you can help change things. The most sustainable clothes are the ones already in your wardrobe. Extending the lifespan of a garment by nine months can reduce its carbon footprint by 20-30 per cent.
