


Introducing Kagera

Our diocese has been linked with the Diocese of Kagera in Tanzania since 1994. Together we work to support one another, share our news and pray for each other.

Kagera is a beautiful region in the northwest of Tanzania. However, it is one of the poorest areas of the country and most of its two million people live on less than £1 a day. In recent years rains have become unpredictable, leading to crop failures and food shortages.

This resource provides opportunities to learn about and pray for the people of Kagera. In doing so, perhaps we will also learn more about ourselves.








How to use this resource -


This resource has been designed for use by schools during Lent.

What can you see?

Learn -


Many of the women in Kagera team together to make crafts. They may have learnt their craft from a family member or a training scheme. The money they make doesn't go on buying things for themselves. Instead they use the extra money to help pay for their children to go to school.



Think -

I wonder...should education be free for everyone?

Pray (if you want to) — ask God to help grow the skills of the women in Kagera.





Learn -

Some people in Kagera can grow enough food to sell some. These crops need to be drought-resistant which means they can survive even when the weather is very dry. Avocados are very popular! Have you ever tried one?




Think -

Thank God for the different seasons and the variety of food we grow. Ask him to send enough rain to Kagera for the plants to grow.





Think -


I wonder... how would you feel if your education finished at age 13? How might this disadvantage you in the future?


Learn -


In Tanzania, children are expected to be in primary school from the age of 7 -13. Some pupils start their schooling later when their family can afford to send them. All Tanzanian families must pay school fees and buy the uniform and school equipment for their children. This is Alice. She went to primary school but not secondary school because her parents needed her to help out at home on their small farm. School was too expensive for the family.



















Learn -


This is Doctor Ethan. He dreamt of becoming a doctor when he was young. The church helped his mum buy him school uniform and continue his studies. After school the government helped him to go to university and now he is training as a doctor.

I wonder... what are your dreams for the future??

Learn -


The school is built on the edge of a rocky hillside. The playground is unfenced and surrounded by fields. Part of this has been cleared for assemblies outside. Children have to be very careful when playing. The ground is uneven with large rocks. There is no soft surfaces to fall on. Children learn to be sensible quickly.

Think -

I wonder... how is this different from your school playground?









In Kagera shops are very small and there are no large supermarkets. Most shopping is done at markets near the side of the road. What can you see being sold?

Think –

I wonder... how would it feel to be at the market? What could you hear? Smell?

Pray (if you want to) -

For the market in Kagera and your local market. That they continue to be busy and successful for all and that by working together communities can help one another.

Learn -

This woman is wearing a kanga. Babies are wrapped in them when they're born, choirs will wear matching ones. Men wear shirts made from them and women dresses or hats. In the home they're used as curtains or tablecloths. Kangas are important enough to hand on to friends and children. They are long lasting and have many uses.

Think -


I wonder... what happens to your old clothes?

Ask God to provide for all the needs of the people of Kagera both young and old.







Tuesday
