When I retire in February it will be almost 10 years since I came to the Diocese and the faithful financial support you have shown has ensured we are now moving towards a much healthier position as benefices and as a Diocese. Crucially, we have committed to maintaining the numbers of stipendiary clergy posts, and to increasing the number of self-supporting ordained ministers and lay ministers. Our focus on this is clearly demonstrated through the 80% of Parish Share that directly supports mission and ministry.

Church tackling food poverty attracts huge support

Pop-Up events were started by St Mary's Church, Hadleigh, to promote a community spirit for those struggling. The events offer a warm space for residents and villagers finding it difficult to pay for soaring energy costs or have a hot meal. The majority of attendees come from Hadleigh, however some people travel to the town and events are also supported by Ukrainians and military families.

In the previous 12 months, 32 Pop-Ups have been held with attendances ranging from 55 to 148, averaging 96 a session.

"In 2023, due to the positive response to the Pop-Ups and because of our ongoing concern as a church about food poverty, economic challenges, soaring energy costs, and social isolation, we expanded the Pop-Ups to make this event more accessible to the wider community."

Safe Harbour supports people with complex needs

Lightwave group Safe Harbour, held in St Helen's Church, Ipswich, is a refuge for those facing life's complex challenges. It was opened in 2021 with the aim of helping people to turn their lives around and was seen as a community for 'people who have been battered and bruised by the storms of life.'

Safe Harbour offers food, warmth and hospitality to those who need it – not least those who are isolated or alone, those struggling with addictions, those navigating physical or mental health challenges, those in economic straits or facing other difficulties.

It provides a safe, loving, Christian community accessible to all, and is flourishing, making a real difference to those who are involved.

Celebrating Messy Church's tenth anniversary

The Messy Church hosted by the Hoxne Benefice and held in the Village Hall at Syleham and Wingford, was launched in 2014 and celebrated its anniversary this September.

Every month, children and their parents gather to take part in a range of fun craft activities, from finger painting to decorating greetings cards.

The Revd Canon Eleanor Goodison, Priest-in-Charge of the Hoxne Benefice, said: "One of the great things about Messy Church is that it's a wonderful way for all the families and parents to socialise and get to know each other and to welcome new families to the church and wider community."

19 children and their families who regularly attend messy church as well as one new family with their daughter attended the celebration.

Messy Church groups are offered in many of our churches throughout Suffolk, often reaching out to families with young children in rural and isolated areas, offering welcome and support with opportunities to grow together as God's people. It is just one example of Growing Younger with all age worship in a multi-parish rural benefice.





Church building to become a community hub

All Saints' Church, Stanton, near Bury St Edmunds, is throwing open its doors to the community by taking out some of its traditional pews to create a flexible space for other activities.

With a £200,000 redevelopment project, the church is disposing of 21 old Markham pews and replacing them with wooden chairs to create a welcoming, warm and wonderful space at the heart of their community, one that is open and accessible to everyone. The aim is to make the building as

hospitable and as friendly as possible with local people taking ownership of their church.

The church hosts a Men's Breakfast once a month and teenagers already use the building as a warm space after school and at weekends. The church hopes to provide an after-school 'drop in' for them, offering toast and tea/hot chocolate etc so they can start their homework, play board games and socialise in a safe space before going home.





Church plant reaches out to people in the community

How do you build a church without a church building? Pop a gazebo up in your front garden of course! Lindbergh Road Community Church (LRCC) was formed in the Priory Heath Estate in Ipswich and currently the church, a gazebo in the Revd Ian Daniels' front garden, has a regular congregation of 20-30 people every Sunday with many others involved in related activities. The church vision is a thriving church for the estate - offering an open door to those in the community who want to journey with them in faith.

The Priory Heath estate is in the bottom 10% of deprivation in Suffolk and there have been recent stabbings in the area relating to drug-related crimes.

The gazebo is a visible presence in the estate and people happen to come across it and stop to chat. Some people donated funds and they bought heaters, urns and a few more mugs and the church has grown from there.

The church offers discipleship as a journey. People can share thoughts, have discussions, talk about a Bible passage and essentially enjoy being together and learning together.

Those who come age from a five year old to an 85+ year old. The congregation is totally intergenerational, and diverse in many ways including neurodiversity.



Weekly Food Bank, Youth Activities and Well-Being Café

St Thomas The Apostle church in Ipswich has a food bank every week, helping up to 50 people with 12 volunteers. They also hold youth activities weekly for up to 30 young people aged 11 to 19 years old, and have a weekly Well-Being café where people can drop in for support every Thursday.

"After spending only a short time with the team, I could so clearly see how passionate they are about caring for people of all ages and backgrounds in and around their church community and, in particular, how much their group of young people value being a part of church activities. The team are really listening to try to understand the challenges and provide a stimulating and safe space for young people to be. It's precious work and brings stability and much needed hope to often fragile lives that are really only just beginning."

OUR FINANCIAL CHALLENGE

Our vision is to be Growing in God with Flourishing Congregations – Making a Difference. To achieve this growth, of course we have to be financially sustainable.

The Diocesan Board of Finance is the charity and administrative hub for the Diocese of St Edmundsbury and Ipswich, we work hard to be financially sustainable, and our expenditure is carefully monitored to ensure our income is used as effectively as possible.

The annual budget for the Diocese is around £10m and in general our finances are relatively stable while continuing to be a challenge.

In 2023 and once again in 2024, we asked people and parishes to give generously and sacrificially, making every effort to support us through Parish Share. It is the generous donations from parishes that enables us to collectively make a difference in our communities.

With rising costs and our commitment to retaining clergy and lay minister numbers, we continue to recognise that our financial conditions remain challenging.

If we are to continue to improve our overall financial position we need to increase the amount of Parish Share collected. In simple terms a 10% increase in Parish Share will ensure a sustainable continuation of the good works of churches in our communities.

"Our national vision is a Christian presence in every community, which we here express as "flourishing congregations making a difference." You can't do that and cut ministerial posts. My own sense indeed is that dioceses that have cut posts to save money are in much the same financial state now as they were before they cut".



In 2023, the total Diocesan income excluding project income was £9,824,000. Our total expenditure was £9,859,000.


Where does our money come from?

WHAT IS PARISH SHARE?

Parish Share is the model our Diocese uses to share the costs of clergy, housing, mission and ministry, governance between every parish in order to fulfil our calling to 'Grow in God'. Parish Share is based on the principle of Christian generosity and mutual support. Parish Share enables us all to contribute together so we can:

- Fund ministry in all our parishes developing enthusiastic ministry teams in every community.
- Join together to grow our mission to Growing in God as we aim to be flourishing congregations making a difference so that together we can have a greater impact.
- Unite in a partnership in proclaiming the Christian faith.

Total costs to be covered by the Parish Share total of £7.57m:

This allocation to each area (benefice) is split into three areas, covering existing ministry, the minister for the next generation and shared costs of church leadership, known as wider church costs:

Local support costs include the maintenance and upkeep of the clergy houses; the training and development of clergy and lay ministry already in post and the support of those training for ministry; and funding clergy relocations when clergy move into a new post in the Diocese.

Support also includes safeguarding, the Registrar, communications and financial governance.


National support costs include the cost of training new clergy; the cost of the General Synod and the work it carries out; the Church of England's contribution to the Anglican Communion; pension contributions for Mission Agencies; and contributions to provide housing for retired clergy.

Parish Share helps cover the costs of running and supporting church ministries in every parish. This includes expenses for local (diocesan) and national church support (wider church).

It funds the ministry we benefit from today and also supports those in training who will lead the church in the future.

Thank you to the 38 churches who gifted over 100% of their Parish Share contribution to support other churches in financial need.

In 2024 Parish Share is resourcing 101 FTE paid parish posts and 19 FTE paid curates in training.



In 2023 we had just under 6,500 weekly givers with the average weekly gift being £13.51 per person per week. For the 1,906 givers from 239 parishes in the Parish Giving Scheme the average weekly gift was £15.56 excluding gift aid.


Whilst this is encouraging, the pace of engagement with Parish Giving Scheme has slowed in the last couple of years. We remain very grateful and thankful for the many examples of sacrificial generosity in giving finances, time and skills across Suffolk but there is still the potential and need to go further.

Our Growing in God strategy and ongoing ministry bid to the Strategic Mission and Ministry

Investment Board (SMMIB) directly address our financial and resourcing challenges with the aim to achieve financial balance and sustainability by 2028/29.

Additional income streams are a valuable support however we still need to increase the number of planned givers as highlighted in the graphs below.

YOUR QUESTIONS ANSWERED

Why doesn't the Church

Commissioners pay for everything?

The Church Commissioners for England have significant funds to support the mission and ministry of the Church of England. Income they receive supports our mission here in this diocese by:

- Paying the stipends for our two Bishops, and the Cathedral Dean
- Providing the house, office accommodation and staffing costs for the Bishop
- Providing an annual grant to help to support ministry in our low-income communities
- Meeting all clergy pension costs for those in ministry up to 1998 (meaning a good proportion of the pension received by our clergy who have already retired is funded by the Commissioners and part of the pension for those who began ministry before 1998, but are yet to retire, will be funded by the Commissioners).

How are ministry (Clergy) costs calculated?

Most clergy are paid a monthly stipend which enables them to exercise ministry without needing to take on another job. In 2023 the basic monthly cost of a full-time stipend, employer's national insurance and a pension contribution is £3,420 (or £41,000 per annum). In addition, rent-free housing is provided to ensure Clergy are able to live within the community they are Church House at called to serve.

Why do we fund the Diocesan Office?

The Diocesan office is here to serve Suffolk as a diocesan resource. It accommodates the operational side of the Diocesan Synod alongside other organisations helping our mission and ministry such as the Education Team serving Church Schools).

The office accommodates meeting and training space to facilitate learning as well as diocesan governance.

What happens if we can't afford to meet our full contribution to Parish Share?

If your parish is unable to meet its Parish Share then assistance is offered by the Parish Financial Support Process.

What if we don't make our full contribution?

If your PCC decides not to meet its full Parish Share the overall consequence is that someone else must pay or fewer paid ministers can be appointed.

Do we still have to pay Parish Share when we don't have a Priest?

A key principle of Parish Share is Christian generosity and mutual support. All parishes experience a vacancy at some point in time and your parish will have been supported by others in your deanery and the wider diocese when you have had a Vicar and they have not. Of course, Parish Share doesn't just fund the ministry you are receiving today but it also helps to fund the training of those who will be providing the ministry in the future.
